Asparagus demand is still exceeding supply due to El Nio weather conditions, which have been made worse by recent hurricanes and storms in the growing regions. Sizing continues to be a challenge as yields continued to run smaller than normal. Shortages are expected to last through January. Supplies for Large, XL, and Jumbo continue to be extremely short. The market continues to be elevated, especially on larger, XL and jumbo sizes. Recommend being flexible with sizing at time of loading.

QUALITY GOOD Mexico continues to harvest healthy volumes of Flora Loca, with a size curve skewing small. The USDA has not reported Mexican 32/36s for the past three weeks due to a lack of supplies. Aside from the 32/36s, there has been more of a balance of supply and demand, which has helped to reduce the cost of harvesting in the fields. When the Aventajada harvest ramps up and moves up in elevation, more sizes should be available. The color of the avocado's skin does not indicate ripeness. Avocados that are ripe and ready to eat may seem green in color, and the skin may be tough to the touch and not offer the same "give" when pressure is applied. When compared to mid and late season avocados, the fruit has less oil and takes longer to ripen.

Northern Mexico has received heavy rain in recent weeks because of the various hurricanes and tropical storms that have impacted the surrounding area. The combination of supply shortages and increased Labor Day demand has created a supply chain imbalance. Extreme heat and humidity have impacted quality and shelf life, contributing to low availability. Quality has reached a seasonal low of 35% pack-out loss of total harvested yields. Within the following two or three weeks, expect to see an overall improvement in pricing, quality, and availability. Peak sizing is currently dominated by small fruit, including 230's and 250's; large and mid-sized fruit will become more available as the current production cycle progresses.

Lemons: Due to this year's heavy rains in California, many lemons were lost. As a result, 140s and smaller are very tight, which has driven up prices to levels that are unusual for this time of year. The 165s and 200s have become quite tight in the last month and are very challenging to cover. Picking has begun in D2 coastal area. There is more choice fruit than normal due to the heavy scarring. Due to the damage, lemons have been difficult to manage.

Oranges: This season's Valencia, which run heavy to 138/113/88s, are ideal for food service. Fruit is tasty, firm, and color great. Brix is at 13-14. In most years, when schools reopen in August because the fruit has grown out of the smaller sizes, the industry faces a demand-supply imbalance. With the amount of small fruit this year, not expecting any big issue. Valencia is not in high demand in July, which will help the overall supply. Valencia is expected to go through October until Navels starts without any gaps.

Produce Category Overview

The impact on the market from Hurricane Idalia is unknown. The commodities that may be impacted are corn, cucumbers, bell peppers, hot peppers, squash, and tomatoes.

Asparagus are extremely limited on Large, Jumbo, and XL. Avocados are limited on 48s and larger due to weather. Blackberries and Raspberries have limited supplies. Brussels Sprouts are slightly better but remain escalated. Chili Peppers remain tight due to the weather. Grapes have been impacted and reduced by 30% due to the recent Hurricane in the west, causing a possible gap before offshore is available in at the end of the year. Iceberg Lettuce is light in weight with undersized head. Good time to promote Broccolini, Carrots, Cauliflowers, Celery, Iceberg, Green and Red Leaf Lettuce, Kale, and Romaine.

Supermarkets ask: Dine in, carry out or delivery?

Wander through some grocery stores and you feel as if you're in a buffet, fast-casual restaurant or food court. The chef-helmed delis and salad bars tempt shoppers to carry out some kale salad punctuated with pink pomegranate arils and pine nuts. The caramelized, crispy Brussels sprouts glisten with bacon, and the cold, crunchy broccoli salad is sweetened with raisins.

Meal kits are proliferating for shoppers who still want to cook but with shortcuts. In between, there are heat-and-eat options — sometimes delivered through a third-party app.

"When you go in a store, we're foodservice as well. You can sit down or carry out. We're trying to meet the customer where they want to be," said Steve Mayer, president of Bashas', based in Chandler, Ariz.

With the return of restaurants after tanking in 2020 and 2021, the competition has fired up in 2023 for grocery retailers trying to nab share of the consumer's 35 meals a week.

In total food and beverage sales, rising inflation increased the retail share in 2022, but foodservice improved in the first quarter of 2023, reported Circana, the consumer behavior analytics firm that merged IRI and NPD's retail-foodservice power.

Bashas' offers foods from popular local eateries, and it hired trend-focused chefs at AJ's, its gourmet banner, to meet the demand.

PRODUCE IN FOODSERVICE-ORIENTED RETAIL

As supermarkets transform at an ever-quickening pace, where does produce play a role?

International Fresh Produce Association's global Technomic data revealed 64% of consumers use foodservice in supermarkets a few times a month or more. Only 17% of consumers believe that fresh produce is not represented well in supermarket foodservice, but two-thirds of shoppers want more prepared options that are healthful, as well as more heat-and-eat vegetables, side dishes and globally inspired choices...

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
